# Toyota announces Winners of the 18<sup>th</sup> (2025) Toyota Dream Car Art Contest



Toyota Motor Corporation has announced the 26 world contest winners of the "Toyota Dream Car Art Contest," an initiative that encourages children from around the world to envision the future of mobility and illustrate their "dream cars."

Launched in 2004, the Toyota Dream Car Art Contest invites children aged 15 and under to imagine and create artwork that depicts their vision of future mobility. Since its establishment, the contest has received approximately 10 million entries from 151 countries and regions. With a mission to "Produce Happiness for All", Toyota is dedicated to fostering a society where everyone can dream of a brighter future and believes in the power of creativity as the driving force. The contest aims to inspire children, the leaders of tomorrow, to unleash their creativity and enjoy having a dream.

In this 18th edition of the contest, national contests were held in 90 countries and regions, and a total of 665,326 entries were received globally by March 2025. From the entries that advanced through the national contests to the world contest, one grand prize winner and seven best finalists were selected in each of the three age categories (ages 7 and under, ages 8 to 11, and ages 12 to 15). Additionally, one entry was chosen for each of the special awards: the "Let's Change the Future of Cars" Award and the "Waku-Doki" Award.

The judging panel consisted of eight experts from diverse fields, including artists, art directors, automotive journalists, and racing team managers, as well as members of Toyota Motor Corporation, who strive to make ever-better cars in areas such as design and technology. The judges engaged in discussions from various perspectives while selecting entries based on the message, originality, and artistic quality of each work.

The judges remarked, "Each entry was unique and brimming with ideas aimed at creating a better future and making the world more exciting." They also noted, "The pure ideas expressed by children, rooted in their everyday lives across different places and environments around the world, were diverse and offered fresh perspectives."

	Judges' comments	The child has captured what she wanted to express, showcasing her passion to draw as well as love for cars. The vibrant hues are striking, and you can sense the artist's experimentation from the shapes of the hearts or from how the colors are mixed. The unique angle adds an engaging dimension to the piece.

	Explanation of artwork	There are so many homeless animals in the world that are starving and have no one to care for them. This special vehicle is equipped with a radar that guides it to these animals and feeds every hungry creature around the world.			
	Judges' comments	Each animal is drawn with such vitality that it brings a sense of life and energy, making even the car feel like a living creature. The contrast of blue and white, the thoughtful arrangement of flowers and animals, the combination of perspectives, such as the bird's-eye view of the cat and the side view of the car, adds an intriguing complexity to the artwork.			
	Cat	tegory 3 (Ages 12-15)			
	Title	Anybody-can-drive Fluffy car			
	Winner	Kotaro Shirato (Age 14, Japan)			
	Explanation of artwork	I have a disability and cannot drive as an adult. But I love cars and my father always takes me for a drive. My idea of a car has tires on all sides, so it can be driven in any direction, and it is soft like a cloud, so no one gets hurt even if it hits someone. If there was a car like this, I could drive it.			
	Judges' comments	You can tell that the artist has thoughtfully considered how to convey his vision. The artwork prompts us to wonder what kind of car it might be, highlighting the idea that cars can adapt to people, including those with disabilities. It's an intuitive and memorable piece that leaves a lasting impression.

	Judges' comments	This artwork brilliantly envisions a superhero vehicle that kids dream of driving, designed to help people during disasters. This car can traverse rugged terrains, navigate water, and even fly, symbolizing hope and assistance in challenging times. It embodies the spirit of a superhero, reminding us of the power of mobility to aid those in need and bring smiles to their faces.
